## One ElderSpirit Couple — In Their Own Words

Roger Golden and Cinny Poppen are delighted to consider themselves part of the ElderSpirit Community and look forward to moving in when our house is ready. We've known about the community for several years but didn't visit until December 2004, when there were only two houses available. We bought one of them.

We moved to Tennessee four years ago from Elgin, Illinois. For a while we mentored at-risk youth; then Roger cared for two severely disabled men while Cinny tutored children in all grades in all subjects. Two years ago we moved foundation for the work of Spiritual Eldering.

In 2003 we became certified as workshop leaders by the Spiritual Eldering Institute, founded by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi. The Institute is focused on the spiritual dimensions of aging, affirmation of the elder years, harvesting of life's wisdom, and leaving a legacy for future generations. Reb Zalman's book *From Age-ing to Sage-ing* provides the foundation for the work of Spiritual Eldering.

We are on the cusp of an aging population explosion with longevity potential unlike any period in history. It is a time for us to retake the positions once held by elders in society so that the world can be a more caring and loving place for all. As certified workshop leaders we desire to share with others a positive approach to aging while being realistic about the challenges. We hope to present our workshops and classes in the Abingdon area.



So I have given up aspirations of being a contractor, here or in a future life...and bless Dene, but I would not be a Project Director either. So I am here in tension and learning to meditate.

The saying goes when you want something done ask someone who is very busy. This turned out to be wisdom for getting the cupolas on top of the homes built. The architect designed cupolas for the eight very high roofs on the homes. Besides serving as decoration, they also serve as vents for the attics.

Charles Dolpp, an engineer, asked the Knights of Columbus at Christ the King Church to volunteer their help with building the edifices. Ray Lopez permitted us to use his garage; Marty Swann and Ed Moser were recruited as the carpenters. Ed Moser told me his arms hurt from not working when they were finished because they were so used to hammering.

The roofing contractors finished the cupolas with vinyl siding and shingles. They were leery about how they would fit when mounted on the roofs. As each one was hoisted in place, one workman remarked that they fit perfectly or within a sixteenth of an inch!

Committee will meet to create a visual presentation of the
emerging community in Abingdon for use in describing
their "parts" to the new extension groups.

A grant from the Retirement Research Foundation is supporting the ESC Extension Project for two years. This same foundation provided the initial grant in 1999 for the start-up of the ElderSpirit Community in Abingdon.
